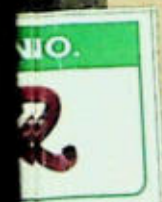

*Rules regarding the preparation of last-pay certificates in cases of transfers on duty.*

**RULE 1.** Transfers on duty may be of two kinds—

*First*—An officer may proceed on duty from one Province or Circle of Audit to another.

*Second*—An officer may proceed on duty from one place to another in the same Province or Circle of Audit.

## First case.

RULE 2. In the first case the officer should obtain a certificate in the following form :—

RULE 3. If he be employed at the station of the Accountant-General of his Presidency or Province, the certificate should be given by that officer.

RULE 4. If he have to pass through that station on his way to his new Presidency or Province, the certificate should be given by the officer in charge of the treasury from which he last drew pay, and countersigned by the Accountant-General.

RULE 5. If he be not employed at, and have not to pass through, the Accountant-General's station, the certificate should be given by the officer in charge of the treasury from which he last drew pay, and a duplicate of it should be forwarded by the Treasury Officer to the Accountant-General for countersignature and transmission to the Accountant-General of the transferred officer's new Presidency or Province.

*Exception.*—As an exception to Rules 3, 4 and 5 above, the last-pay certificates of non-gazetted officers, transferred from one province or circle of audit to another, may be given by the head of the office, and need not be countersigned by the Audit Officer concerned.

RULE 6. In the second case the officer should obtain a last-pay certificate in the same form from the officer in charge of the treasury from which he last drew pay.

APPENDIX No. 4A.—*Referred to in Note 2 to Article 81.*

*Rules governing the appointment and allowances of Settlement Officers and Assistant Settlement Officers.*

1. A member of the Indian or Statutory Civil Service or of the Commission of a Non-Regulation province, or an officer of the Provincial Civil Service holding a listed post of Collector or Deputy Commissioner, who is employed as a Settlement Officer, draws (a) the pay or salary, which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line and not holding a special appointment and (b) an allowance of Rs. 150 per mensem which counts as part of salary. The emoluments enjoyed by a Settlement Officer under this rule are ordinarily subject to a maximum limit of Rs. 2,000 per mensem. But when the special circumstances of a settlement render it desirable to retain an officer upon whom this limit would operate harshly, the Government of India may, as a special case, relieve him from the operation of the maximum for a term not longer than a year.

2. A member of the Indian or Statutory Civil Service or of the Commission of a Non-Regulation province, who is employed as an Assistant Settlement Officer, draws (a) the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line and not holding a special appointment, and (b) an allowance of Rs. 100 per mensem which counts as part of salary. This rule does not apply to an Assistant who is attached to a settlement for training only, and is not in subordinate charge of any portion of the operations.

3. Settlement Officers and Assistant Settlement Officers who are members of the Indian or Statutory Civil Service or of the Commission of a Non-Regulation province or are members of the Provincial Civil Service holding listed appointments of Collector or Deputy Commissioner may, while on actual duty or on privilege leave, be seconded from the regular line, if the Local Government may by general or special order so direct and if the appointment held by such officer is not provided for in the regular grades of Collectors or Deputy Commissioners or Joint Magistrates, etc. An officer of the regular line may be appointed to officiate for a Settlement Officer or an Assistant Settlement Officer absent on privilege leave or on leave for not more than six consecutive months during the progress of a settlement; but in such cases the *locum tenens* cannot be seconded. If a Settlement Officer or Assistant Settlement Officer belonging to the services mentioned in this Rule, who is seconded, takes combined leave during the progress of a settlement for a longer period than six consecutive months he reverts to his substantive appointment in the regular line after the expiry of the privilege leave portion of his combined leave;

but if he takes leave of any other description for a period exceeding six months during the progress of a settlement, or if he takes any leave after the termination of his settlement, he must first revert to his substantive appointment in the regular line.

4. A Collector or Deputy Commissioner who is a member of the Indian or Statutory Civil Service or of the Commission of a Non-Regulation province, or who is a member of the Provincial Service holding a listed post of Collector or Deputy Commissioner, and who is placed in charge of the settlement of his district in addition to his ordinary duties draws, in addition of his salary as Collector or Deputy Commissioner, an allowance of Rs. 150 per mensem, which counts as part of salary. It is open to the Local Government to declare that such a Collector or Deputy Commissioner who is in charge of the settlement of a less area than an entire district shall be entitled to some allowance not exceeding Rs. 150 a month.

5. In any province except Bombay the Local Government may grant a member of the Indian or Statutory Civil Service or of the Commission of a Non-Regulation province who is below the rank of Collector or Deputy Commissioner and is employed on settlement work in addition to his ordinary duties an allowance not exceeding Rs. 100 per mensem (which counts as part of salary) in addition to the pay or salary otherwise admissible to him. In Bombay the Local Government may grant a similar allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem to an Assistant Collector in administrative charge of a subdivision when employed in preparing the revision settlement report of the subdivision in addition to his ordinary duties.

6. A member of the Provincial Civil Service in Madras, Bengal, Bihar and Orissa, and Assam who is specially appointed to settlement work which lasts or is expected to last for not less than six months, draws (a) the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line, and (b) a special local allowance of Rs. 100 per mensem. A member of the Subordinate Civil Service in these provinces draws in similar circumstances a special local allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem in addition to the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line. A Deputy Collector in Bombay appointed to settlement work draws (a) the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line and not holding a special appointment, (b) a special local allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem and (c) the permanent travelling and tentage allowances of his grade. A Munsiff in Bengal, Bihar and Orissa and Assam deputed for settlement training draws (a) the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line, and (b) a special local allowance of Rs. 100 per mensem.

7. A member of the Provincial Civil Service in the Central Provinces, Burma, Punjab, and Baluchistan who is employed as an Assistant Settlement Officer draws a special local allowance of Rs. 100 per mensem in addition to the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line. A member of the Provincial Civil Service in the North-West Frontier Province and of the Subordinate Civil Service in the Central Provinces, Burma, and Baluchistan draws when similarly employed a special local allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem in addition to the pay or salary which would be admissible to him if serving in the regular line.

APPENDIX No. 6A.—*Referred to in Article 21A.**Rules for reckoning leave in the case of officers stationed in certain remote districts outside India.*

1. Officers who proceed on leave from or who on return from leave are posted to (1) Seistan, Birjand, Turbat-i-Haidari, or Koh-i-Malik Siah, (2) Kerman, (3) Kermanshah, and (4) Kashgar are allowed, subject to the restriction mentioned below, to reckon their leave as beginning or ending on the day on which they arrive at (1) Meshed or Quetta or Nushki, (2) Karachi or Meshed, (3) Karachi or Resht, and (4) Srinagar or the nearest point on the Russian Railway.

NOTE.—[A similar concession is allowed to the subordinates of the Khorasan Agency who are natives of India and they can reckon their leave as beginning or ending on the day on which they arrive at Quetta or Nushki.]

The following periods of leave have been fixed for the performance of the journeys and an officer's leave commences from the date on which he arrives at the fixed point or from the date of expiry of the fixed period, whichever is earlier. Similarly the leave terminates from the date of arrival at the fixed point or on the day preceding that from which the fixed period begins, whichever is later :—

NOTE.—[Kermanshah should be held to be excluded from this concession in cases of officers proceeding on, or returning from, privilege leave.]

While travelling to or returning from the points of departure from which the leave is reckoned officers are treated as on duty entitling them to salary and travelling allowance as for journeys on transfer under the ordinary rules.

NOTE 1.—[A subordinate officer of the class referred to in Article 1098 of these Regulations when proceeding on leave from, or returning from leave to, Persia shall be permitted to transport his family to and from India at the cost of Government once only in every four years, not including the original journey on joining, and the final journey on relinquishing his appointment in Persia.]

NOTE 2.—[When an officer, of the class referred to above, employed in Persia, proceeds on leave and avails himself of the concessions allowed by this Appendix, no substitute shall, except with the express previous concurrence of the Government of India, be imported from India to fill a vacancy of less than three months, exclusive of the time, if any, allowed for travelling to and from the fixed points which are referred to in this Appendix.]

NOTE 3.—[An officer whose transfer is ordered while he is on privilege leave or is about to proceed on such leave from the places specified in the opening clause of paragraph 1 of this Appendix is entitled, in addition to the concession allowed therein, to the ordinary joining time admissible under Article 182 of these Regulations, his "station" being taken for this purpose as Quetta or Nushki or one of the other places mentioned as fixed points in this Appendix, as the case may be. Such officer shall not be entitled to the special rate of joining time prescribed for journeys on transfer to and from appointments in Persia.]

NOTE 4.—[An officer whose leave commences or terminates from the date of arrival at one of the fixed points mentioned in this rule is not entitled to the concession referred to in the Exception to Article 251 of these Regulations.]

2. Officers who on return from leave other than privilege leave are posted to, or who proceed on such leave from, stations in Persia or in the Persian Gulf, Arabia or Mesopotamia, such as Ahwaz, Maskat, Baghdad, which though comparatively easy of access, are far removed from stations from which leave is ordinarily reckoned, shall be considered to be on subsidiary leave and entitled to draw subsidiary leave allowances from the date of their debarkation or embarkation at Karachi in cases when they actually land in India, or from the date of their debarkation or embarkation at the port nearest to the point to

which they stand posted or at which they have been employed in the event of their not touching at Karachi, and shall be allowed travelling allowance to and from such port as for journeys on transfer under the ordinary rules.

The subsidiary leave admissible for the journeys between Karachi and the places named has been fixed as follows :—

Officers who proceed on leave, other privilege leave, to Europe from Baghdad, or who are posted to Baghdad on return from such leave, and who select to travel *via* Aleppo, or Damascus, are entitled to subsidiary leave, not exceeding fifteen days, for the journey between Baghdad and the railroad at Aleppo, or Damascus, as the case may be; and also to a fixed travelling allowance of Rs. 270 for gazetted officers, and Rs. 140 for non-gazetted officers, in respect of these journeys.

3. Officers stationed in Chumbi and at Gyantse who proceed on or return from leave other than privilege leave, shall be considered to be on subsidiary leave during the journeys from their stations to Gangtok or *vice versa*, and shall be allowed subsidiary leave allowances and travelling allowances as for journeys on transfer under the ordinary rules.

The subsidiary leave admissible for the journeys between Gangtok and Chumbi and Gyantse has been fixed as follows :—

The subsidiary leave of an officer returning from leave begins from the date of arrival at Gangtok or from the date from which the fixed period commences, whichever is later. NOTE 2.—[Pressmen, whose pay, if in receipt of fixed pay, or whose emoluments, if paid for piece-work are not less than Rs. 15 a month, are, with effect from 1st April 1894, treated as Superior servants. One-half of service as pressmen rendered previous to that date on pay or emoluments of Rs. 15 a month or over is also reckoned as Superior service.]

Serangas of Lascars, Tindals of Lascars, Serangas of Stokers, Tindals of Stokers, Engine-drivers, Seacunnies, Carpenters and Carpenters' Mates.

Dockyard Serangas and Tindals, Head Foreman of Shipwrights on Rs. 180, Foreman of Shipwrights on Rs. 100, Foreman of Shipwrights on Rs. 80, Foreman of Shipwrights on Rs. 70, Foreman of Sawyers on Rs. 135, and Engine-drivers, pumping Engine, on Rs. 100 employed in the Bombay Dockyard and Timber Converter employed in the Kidderpore Dockyard.

NOTE.—[Crews of Royal Indian Marine vessels in all ratings entertained after the 21st August 1883 are not entitled to any pension.]

- (4) Transport Department, in receipt of pay at the rate of Rs. 30 a-month.

Sarkar, Counting and Godown, in the Stamp and Stationery Offices, Calcutta.

Seacunnies in Bengal and Assam.

Section-writers admitted under Rule 4 under Article 487 in those months only in which their earnings exceed Rs. 10.

Shroffs whose pay exceeds Rs. 15; also all Shroffs of the Revenue Department in Madras and of the Resident's Treasury, Mysore, and all Shroffs of the Madras Currency Office whose pay exceeds Rs. 10, and those in Bombay who were really clerks, and those whose designation was in October 1858, changed into Karkuns.

Stipendiary Village Accountants (including those paid according to Wingate's scale), Bombay, whose offices are not hereditary. The service of such officers is superior even if their pay does not exceed Rs. 10.

Vaccinators, including, in the Central Provinces, the Madras Presidency and the United Provinces, those whose pay is Rs. 10 a month.

Victualling Gomastahs.

Weighmen in the Mints whose pay exceeds Rs. 15 and Weighmen attached to the Opium Agencies in Malwa drawing Rs. 10 and upwards a month.

#### APPENDIX No. 8.—*Referred to in Article 429.*

*Correspondence regarding the conditions on which a "compensation pension" is admissible.*

EXTRACT I.—The Governor-General in Council desires that the attention of the several Departments of the Government of India and of Local Governments be drawn to the conditions prescribed in the..... (Civil Service Regulations) for the admission of claims to Compensation pension. Such pension is only granted to an officer discharged from the public service when, *on a reduction of establishment*, his appointment is abolished. It is further prescribed that such abolition must produce a real saving to Government in respect of the cost of the appointment, and that the saving should always exceed the cost of the pension to be granted to the incumbent of the abolished appointment.

2. Notwithstanding these clear provisions in the rules, applications are frequently made for the grant of pension to officers discharged from the public service, though the discharge of the officer does not result in any saving to the State. The consequence is that

the Governor-General in Council is under the necessity of rejecting such applications, or to refer cases of more than ordinary hardship to the Secretary of State for special consideration.

3. It is not desirable that frequent relaxations of the rules should be permitted. At the same time, it involves serious hardship if officers are thrown out of employment when they have not failed in the discharge of their public duties, and are refused all compensation therefor.

4. The Governor-General in Council therefore deems it necessary to remind all Departments, Local Governments, and officers concerned that, in any scheme for re-organising an establishment, the claims to pension that may arise in consequence of the re-organisation should always be considered before a change is made, and, except in cases of very urgent necessity, no revision of establishment should be carried out which would have the effect of giving rise to claims to compensation pension, the cost of which cannot be met out of savings effected by the revision. As stated in..... (Article 429), if the saving does not exceed the cost of the pension, "it may be better to postpone the reduction of establishment or abolition of appointment."—(*Circular by the Government of India, Finance Department, No. 1690, dated 22nd July 1878.*)

EXTRACT II.—5. It is doubtless the duty of all public officers to take every suitable opportunity to introduce improvements in the Administration, and as the rules now stand, personal claims such as those of *A B* often impede administrative reforms otherwise desirable. But it is easy to see that, if the Government were prepared to compensate every one whom it is desired to supersede on such occasions, reforms might indeed proceed more rapidly, but an indefinitely large expenditure for compensation pensions might ensue; and this the Government of India is not at present authorised to incur, or prepared to recommend to the Secretary of State.

6. Local improvements must, therefore, be carried out with a due regard to these considerations; and it should be clearly understood that, if a public servant is discharged, as, in the present instance, *A B* has been discharged, a remedy at the charge of the public revenues for the loss he sustains is not to be expected.—(*Government of India, Finance Department, to Bombay, No. 2653, dated 6th September 1878.*)

APPENDIX No. 9.—*Referred to in Articles 470 (a) and 923 (a), Note.*

*Orders of the Secretary of State deprecating recommendations for "special pensions."*

EXTRACT I.—8. I take this opportunity of calling your attention to the practice of recommending Uncovenanted Servants for special pensions. The Code of rules, which was published on the 4th of January 1831, prescribed that "the rates of pension shall be fixed on a graduated scale, within the prescribed limitations, with reference to the responsibility and arduousness of the employment, the degree of merit of the individual, and the nature and length of his service," and in my Financial Despatch of the 8th of December 1862, No. 205, I observed (*paragraph 9*) that "pensions of the full amount stated are to be granted only as the reward of approved service." It appears, however, to be the custom of Heads of Departments in India to recommend, in nearly every case, the full amount of pension which the rules permit, and whenever the service rendered has been at all above the average character, a special pension is recommended in excess of that which the rules authorise.

9. It cannot be too strongly insisted upon, and made known to the whole body of Uncovenanted Officers, that the full pension authorised under the rules is not to be given as a matter of course, but only when the service performed has been really such as to merit the approval of Government, and this should be invariably kept in view in considering recommendations for pension. It is easy for your Government to keep within the limits which the rules authorise; but there is a manifest inconvenience in the Home Government refusing to grant a special pension which may have been submitted to them with the weight which must always attach to a recommendation by your Government.—(*Secretary of State, No. 174, dated 30th September 1863.*)

EXTRACT II.—3.....You enquire whether it is open to your Government, under..... (Article 475) to recommend to the Home Government the grant of special pensions, not only in excess of the money limits prescribed by the rules, but also in excess of the limits of one-third or one-half of average emoluments, as the case may be.

4. The Pension Code published by you merely embodies existing rules as to the grant of pensions and interpretations thereof, and is intended for the guidance and information of your officers; but it can scarcely be held to absolutely preclude your Government

from making any special representation to the Secretary of State you may see fit in any particular case.

5. The inconvenience, however, of recommending Uncovenanted servants for special pensions unauthorised by the rules was pointed out in paragraphs 8 and 9 of the Financial Despatch dated 30th September 1863, No. 174, and I see no reason to modify the opinion therein expressed.—(*Secretary of State, No. 401, dated 24th September 1872.*)

EXTRACT III.—I desire to express my general disinclination to increase the non-effective charges by the grant of any pensions in excess of what the Regulations of the Service provide, save in cases of very exceptional and distinguished service. Mere length of service, however faithfully performed, is not, I consider, in itself a sufficient ground for exceptional rewards.—(*Secretary of State, No. 92, dated 8th March 1877.*)

EXTRACT IV.—2.....I understand Your Excellency to recognise the objections which exist to the grant of a pension in excess of that laid down by the rules, and which appear to me to have great weight. In England the scale of superannuation is prescribed by Act of Parliament, and cannot be exceeded, and, without going so far as to say that the Indian Regulations must be held to be equally absolute, I am of opinion that departures from them should be extremely rare, and should only be permitted when the service is of a nature not ordinarily falling within the duty that may be expected from an officer who has been promoted to the highest position in his Department.

3. The grant of a bonus has been allowed in certain cases, when paid in India as a mode of reducing the sterling payments. If issued in England, it loses that character, and ceases to be of any advantage to the Government as an alternative mode of rewarding an officer on retirement.

4. ....I request that, in future, the ordinary pension of Rs. 5,000 and the special additional pension of Rs. 1,000 in such circumstances as are covered by the last paragraph of Sir Henry Fowler's Despatch of 11th April 1895, No. 59, may be held to be the highest amounts to be awarded, unless under wholly exceptional conditions.—(*Secretary of State, No. 121 (Financial), dated 7th July 1898.*)

EXTRACT V.—2. As Your Excellency is aware, the grant of pensions in excess of Rs. 5,000 a year to officers other than those eligible for special pensions in virtue of the tenure of the appointments enumerated in Articles 475, 642, and 643 of the Civil Service Regulations, has been narrowly restricted by repeated rulings of my predecessors in office (quoted in Appendix 9 of the Civil Service Regulations) to cases of very exceptional merit; and I am unwilling to relax those restrictions.

3. I do not overlook the testimony borne by the Government of \* \* \* to the devotion and conscientious discharge of duty shown by \* \* \* ; but I cannot consider that the post filled by him previous to his retirement was of so important a nature, or that his services in it were of so distinguished and exceptional a character, as to justify his admission to a special pension. I am unable, therefore, to comply with your recommendation in his favour.—(*Secretary of State, No. 224 (Financial), dated 25th December 1903.*)

EXTRACT VI.—2. You refer to Lord George Hamilton's Financial Despatch No. 121, dated 7th July 1898, in which it was requested that, for the future, the ordinary pension of Rs. 5,000, and the special additional pension of Rs. 1,000, in cases where the grant of the latter was covered by the regulations, should be held to be the highest amounts to be awarded, unless under wholly exceptional conditions. Nevertheless you consider that \* \* \* service has been so exceptionally distinguished and meritorious as to justify you in making your present recommendation in his favour.

3. I agree in the views expressed by Lord George Hamilton, and others of my predecessors, as to the necessity for restricting the grant of special pensions of this kind to cases of the most exceptional merit; in which the service has been of a nature not ordinarily falling within the duty that may be expected from an officer who has been promoted to the highest position in his Department. With much reluctance, but without misgiving as to the importance of the principle, I find myself unable to accept the recommendation.—(*Secretary of State, No. 127-Financial, dated 18th September 1908.*)

EXTRACT VII.—The expression "service of a nature not ordinarily falling within the duty" of an officer is capable of being understood as including service appertaining to another branch of the administration than that in which the officer is employed. An example of this would arise if an officer in one Department did, in his spare time, something that was helpful in the working of another Department. It is in this sense that "work outside the ordinary course of an officer's duties" is understood in Article 72 of the Civil Service Regulations which provides for the grant of honoraria. But the corresponding phraseology in the rulings regarding special pensions should be understood as having a different meaning, viz., as applying only to cases in which an officer, besides having shown very distinguished merit, has discharged successfully duties, which, while falling to him in the course of his official work, were so exceptional and exacting that

they could not ordinarily and reasonably be regarded as forming part of the normal duties of his post. I do not overlook the fact that the effect of the present decision, so far as it differs from those previously given, is to emphasise the restrictions on the grant of pensions beyond the amount allowed by the Regulations. This is in accordance with the general tendency of the action taken by my predecessors in dealing with particular cases, as is shown by the fact that in the last five years only four pensions have been granted in excess of the maxima ordinarily admissible under the Regulations.—*(Secretary of State No. 28-Financial, dated 15th March 1912.)*

APPENDIX No. 10.—*Referred to in Articles 531 (a) and 941.*

RULES RELATING TO THE COMMUTATION OF PENSIONS, WITH TABLE OF PRESENT VALUES.

1. Subject to the conditions stated below, a Local Government may, at its discretion and on the application of the holder, order the commutation for a lump sum of a portion of a pension which has been sanctioned by it or by an authority subordinate to it.

2. Applications for commutation shall be made in the Form appended to these rules.

3. The Local Government shall satisfy itself that the commutation will be to the distinct and permanent advantage of the pensioner or his family and may, at its discretion, require guarantees and impose such terms and safeguards as it may deem fit to ensure the prudent application of the amount payable in commutation, if sanctioned.

4. (a) If on consideration of the facts stated in the application, the Local Government decides to allow commutation, the applicant should be required to produce a certificate as to his expectation of life, from a medical officer who should be of not lower standing than a Civil Surgeon, District Medical Officer or Presidency Surgeon. The Local Government may further, at its discretion, require a second medical opinion or direct the applicant to appear before a Medical Board.

(b) The certifying Surgeon or Board shall subject the applicant to a strict medical examination, requiring him to give such information as to his health and habits as is usual in the case of persons proposing to assure their lives in assurance companies, and will report in the following form :—

" I <sup>1</sup> <sub>We</sub> have carefully examined.....and <sup>am</sup> <sub>are</sub> of opinion that he <sup>is</sup> <sub>is not</sub> in good bodily health and <sup>has</sup> <sub>has not</sub> the prospect of an average duration of life. I <sup>1</sup> <sub>We</sub>, therefore, <sup>do</sup> <sub>do not</sub> recommend compliance with his application to be allowed to capitalise a portion of his pension."

In the case of impaired lives in which compliance with the officer's application is recommended, but with an addition of years of age, the following should be added :

" but as he is suffering from.....his age, for purposes of commutation, should be taken to be.....years."

(c) In the case of an applicant who has been awarded an invalid pension, the grounds of invaliding or the statement of the pensioner's medical case, should be communicated to the certifying medical authority.

(d) The pension of a pensioner whose age is more than seventy years, with or without an addition of years as an impaired life, cannot be commuted except by special order of the Government of India.

(e) The applicant should himself pay the medical officer's fee for examination except when a second medical opinion is required or the applicant is directed to appear before a Medical Board, in which cases the examination will be made free of charge by medical officers at the request of the authorities indicated in rule 12.

5. The Local Government should assure itself that the residue of pension which will be left after commutation is sufficient to maintain the pensioner in accordance with his station in life in retirement, due regard being had to the manner of application of the amount realised on commutation. In no case shall commutation be sanctioned which will leave the pensioner in receipt of less than three-fourths of the pension originally issued to him.

6. The lump sum payable on commutation will be the amount certified by the Audit Officer to be admissible according to the annexed Table A of present values in this Appendix.

7. Commutation, when sanctioned, shall take effect from a date, to be named in the order, which should ordinarily be about one month later than the date of the order; and all calculations shall be made with reference to that date. The sum payable in commutation will be paid on or as soon as possible after the date specified and payment of the commuted portion of the pension will cease from that date.

NOTE.—In special cases the Local Government may sanction the commutation with effect from an earlier date than that mentioned in this rule not preceding the date of the sanction, all calculations being made with reference to such earlier date.

8. A commutation once applied for, sanctioned, and given effect to, cannot be rescinded, i.e., the portion of a pension commuted cannot be restored on refund of its capitalised value.

9. If a pensioner, whose pension has been commuted, dies before receiving the commutation value, this value is payable to his heirs.

10. In the case of a pensioner who is re-employed in Government service or in the service of a Local Fund and who commutes a portion of his pension before or after such re-employment his pension for the purposes of the rules in Chapter XXI of the Civil Service Regulations shall be taken at the full amount which he might have drawn if he had not commuted a portion of it.

11. A Local Government or the Head of a Department, through whom an application for commutation requiring sanction of higher authority has been forwarded, may reject the application if satisfied that it is not a case in which commutation should be allowed. The applicant's right of appeal will be regulated by the Memorial Rules.

12. These powers will be exercised by the Local Governments specified in Part I of Appendix No. 1; by the General Officers Commanding, Northern and Southern Armies in respect of officers under their orders who are not appointed directly by the Government of India; and by the Departments of the Government of India in respect of officers serving under them and not under a Local Government.

13. Applications for the commutation of pensions of officers in Imperial Departments directly subordinate to the Government of India should, if their transmission is decided on, be forwarded by the Head of the Department to the Administrative Department of the Government of India concerned. Other cases of commutation requiring the sanction of the Government of India should, if the Local Government or Head of a Department decides on their transmission, be forwarded to the Finance Department of the Government of India. Questions relating to the interpretation of these rules or their relaxation should also be addressed to the Finance Department.

14. All sanctions to the commutation of a pension must be subject to the usual rule that the expenditure can be met from sanctioned budget grants. The payment of the capitalised sum must be taken in India.

15. These rules apply only to pensioners drawing pensions directly or indirectly from Indian Treasuries. Other pensioners should apply to the India Office, when their applications will be considered on their merits.

The above rates will be allowed for officers under class IV only when embarking under special circumstances : when travelling as ordinary passengers, the rates laid down in paragraph 268 will be allowed.

256. When the Viceroy, a Governor or Commander-in-Chief proceeds in a ship on a tour of inspection which requires him to disembark at various ports, the higher rate a day will, in general, only be paid for the seven days' entertainment following his first embarkation. If there are special reasons for repeating this payment, the officer in command of the vessel may represent the circumstance to the official entertained for consideration; and, if subsequently necessary, to the Government of India.

257. When more than one distinguished person is embarked at the same time, the person of the highest rank is to be paid for according to the scale, and the other or others only at the rate of Rs. 14 or Rs. 12 a day per head, as the case may be.

258. The sums specified in the scale include provision for a reasonable number of servants and for extra expenses of every kind.

259. Rations are issued on account of the entertainment of a reasonable number of servants belonging to and embarked with passengers, and the cost of which is borne by the Government of India; while any further expense, except for bedding and such fittings as a dockyard may be ordered to furnish, is to be covered by the sum paid on account of the officer's entertainment.

260. The periods for which the rates are to be paid shall commence on the day on which the first, and terminate on that on which the last, dinner is taken on board.

261. Should a passenger for whom provision is made under competent authority not embark, or having embarked subsequently disembark, or be transferred to another ship, the mess will be entitled to half the allowance to cover the expenses incurred in making the necessary preparations. No deduction is to be made from the allowance for the time passengers may land at intermediate places for their own pleasure.\*

\* Applicable to all Royal Indian Marine vessels when carrying passengers.

262. When any official is ordered a passage, the officer commanding the vessel will inform such passenger of the rate authorised for his entertainment, and arrange for payment of the amount before the passenger leaves the ship. Paragraph 533\* of Part I of these Regulations applies to all Royal Indian Marine vessels, whether troopships or not.

263. Should the passenger not be satisfied with the statement of the commander of the vessel as to the class in the scale under which he is required to pay, the matter is to be at once referred to the authority ordering the passage. In the event of the latter officer agreeing with the passenger, the rate specified by the commander of the vessel should be paid and the circumstance reported to the Government of India.

*Classification of passengers, their families and servants, in hired transports, and when travelling as ordinary passengers in Royal Indian Marine ships.*

Karkuns of the Uran Taluka; the talati of Shve Saza in the Uran Mahal of the Panvel Taluka; and the Revenue and Police patil of the island of Elephanta in the Uran Petha in the Panvel Taluka of the Kolaba district.

2. An Opium Factory Assistant, while employed in superintending the unloading, etc., of opium chests, is entitled, in addition to any other travelling allowance which may be admissible, to a daily conveyance allowance of Rs. 2 if at Calcutta and Re. 1 if at Howrah.

3. Officers of the Salt Department, Madras, engaged in the supervision of shipments of salt exported from the Presidency, are entitled to actual expenses incurred by them on boat hire in proceeding to and returning from ships employed in the carriage of salt.

3A. Inspectors, Assistant Inspectors, Sub-Inspectors and other subordinates of the Salt, Abkari and Customs Department in charge of Sea Customs Offices, Madras, are entitled to actual expenses incurred by them on boat hire when patrolling, and proceeding to and returning from inspection of ships.

3B. The Distillery Supervisors, Northern and Southern Circles, Bombay Presidency, are entitled to actual conveyance hire for the journeys undertaken by them for visiting the distilleries and breweries in their charge, subject to a maximum of rupee one in the case of the former and of rupees two in that of the latter, for each journey.

4. The Inspector of the Preventive Department, Calcutta Custom House, who is deputed to inspect the salt registers, etc., of the manufacturers of salt, alkali or hydrochloric acid, is entitled to actual conveyance hire for his journeys to and from the manufactories.

4A. Appraisers of the Karachi Customs House are entitled to actual conveyance charges, subject to the maximum of Rs. 1-8-0 per trip, for their journeys to the Karachi Post Office to examine and assess the duty on articles received from foreign ports by post.

4B. The Inspector of steam boilers stationed permanently in Sind is allowed actual conveyance expenses for inspecting boilers in the town of Karachi.

4C. The Inspector of European Schools, Bombay Presidency and Central Provinces, is entitled to a conveyance allowance of Rs. 3 a day for the period during which he is engaged on inspection duty in the city of Bombay.

4D. Clerks of the Inspector of European Schools, Bombay Presidency and Central Provinces, of the Deputy Educational Inspector, Bombay, and of the Inspectress of Girls' Schools in Bombay and Northern Division, are entitled to a conveyance allowance of 12 annas each *per diem* on the day on which they accompany the Inspector or Deputy Inspector or Inspectress on inspection duty in the city.

4E. Six Customs Preventive Officers employed on shore patrol duty on the Calcutta side of the river Hooghly, are entitled to an allowance of Re. 1 each *per diem* on account of carriage or boat hire for following up smugglers or smuggled goods.

4F. Surveyors in charge of the survey classes at Poona and Belgaum in the Bombay Presidency are entitled to actual conveyance hire subject to a maximum of 8 annas a day.

5. The two forest guards in charge of the Uran sub-range of the Panvel taluka are entitled to an allowance of Re. 1 a month each for journeys by boat to and from the island of Elephanta on duty.

5A. Treasurers and other subordinates in Currency Offices and in the Exchange Treasury, Allahabad, are permitted to draw actual conveyance allowance when required to travel on business to a place in the neighbourhood of their offices.

6. The clerk of the Additional Judge of the 24-Parganas is allowed actual conveyance hire between Alipore and Howrah while the sessions are held at the latter place.

7. The Jailer of the Presidency Jail, Calcutta, may draw carriage hire at the rate of Rs. 1½ a day for journeys to and from the High Court on duty.

8. The Jailer of His Majesty's Penitentiary, Madras, may draw carriage hire to and from the High Court on duty.

8A. Clerks of the Office of the Inspector-General of Prisons, Bombay, when detailed to inspect the Offices of the Yeravda Central Prison and the printing press attached to it are entitled to draw actual conveyance charges for their journeys from Poona City to Yeravda and back.

8B. The Deputy Educational Inspector and each of the five Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors in the Poona District are entitled to a carriage allowance of Rs. 70 per annum for the journeys performed by them in connection with the inspection of Municipal and aided schools at Poona.

8C. The Auditor in the office of the Director of Agriculture at Poona is entitled to actual conveyance hire for journeys within five miles of his head-quarters.

9. Head constables and constables travelling on duty between Uran and Elephanta, and between Uran and Hog Island, are entitled to actual travelling expenses by boat, subject to a maximum of Re. 1 for head constables and of 8 annas for constables.

10. A subordinate officer of the Bombay City, Madras City, Rangoon Town or Calcutta Town and Suburban Police draws actual conveyance hire when travelling on duty within a short distance of head-quarters in the following cases, provided always that, whenever practicable, the tramway cars shall be used, and not hack carriages:—

- (a) To any Court and back to quarters, when attending Court on duty, or to give evidence provided the quarters are not near to the Court.
- (b) When directed by the Court to serve any immediate process.
- (c) When directed to bring a witness who is immediately required in Court.
- (d) When taking to and from Court a prosecutor, prisoner, or witness who is unable, from illness, injuries, or any other good cause, to walk to and from the Court, and who has no money.
- (e) When proceeding to ships in harbour by the direction of a Magistrate and for serving processes of the Court in Marine cases, whenever such expenses are not recoverable from the parties concerned. In this case boat hire may also be sanctioned when necessary.
- (f) When bringing European or any other prisoners, whom it may not be safe to lead along the public streets, from jail, etc., and taking them back.
- (g) When required to go on duties which the Commissioner of Police may certify to be emergent.
- (h) In the case of heinous offences or other crimes which, in accordance with standing police rules, have to be investigated on the spot by European officers or detectives.
- (i) When searching for or pursuing escaped criminals.
- (j) When employed upon special duty, in connection with the Mohurram, or to preserve order at any place of public resort, worship, entertainment or public gathering, provided that the distance exceeds one mile and the Commissioner certifies that the charge is necessary.
- (k) In the case of European members of the Police Force not drawing permanent horse or conveyance allowance, to and from their head-quarters when employed on any of the duties mentioned in the preceding rules, or when required to attend the Commissioner's Office, provided the Commissioner certifies that the charge is necessary.
- (l) European Inspectors and Deputy Inspectors and Sergeants of the Police Force may charge the actual cost of moving their luggage on transfer from one station to another in the city, provided that the charge shall not exceed Rs. 8 in the case of an Inspector and Rs. 5 in the case of a Deputy Inspector and Sergeant.

- (m) The following subordinate officers of the Bombay and Madras City Police, may charge the actual cost of moving their luggage on transfer from one station to another within the City, subject to the following maximum rates :—

- (n) Subordinate officers of the Calcutta City Police may charge the actual cost of moving their luggage on transfer from one station to another in the City, subject to the following maximum rates :—

11. The Deputy Shipping Master, Calcutta, is entitled to actual travelling expenses for boarding vessels for the purposes of shipping and discharging crews and inspecting provisions, etc.

12. The Huzoor Deputy Collector of Hyderabad for the time being who performs the duties of the Superintendent of the Economic Garden in the town of Hyderabad may draw for carriage expenses in connection with the discharge of such duties an allowance not exceeding Rs. 15 a month.

13. The District Locomotive Superintendent at Sealdah and the Assistant Traffic Superintendent at Chitpore, Eastern Bengal State Railway, are entitled to actual conveyance charges up to a maximum of Rs. 20 a month each, for their journeys on duty between Sealdah and Chitpore.

14. The Assistant Surgeon attached to the Balasore Central Hospital is entitled to actual conveyance expenses when he is required to attend the subordinates of the Small Arms Range during the absence of the Civil Surgeon from the station.

15. Inspectors and Sub-Inspectors of the Central Police Training School, Bombay, are entitled to a daily allowance of Re. 1 and annas 8 respectively, when actually away from the school on practical work.

#### APPENDIX No. 28.—*Referred to in Article 1087.*

##### I.

*Rules made under the Statute 43 Vict., Cap. 3, by the Secretary of State for India in Council fixing the allowances for equipment and voyage of the Governor-General of India, Members of Council of the Governor-General of India, the Governors of Madras, Bombay and Bengal, the Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in India, and the Bishops of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, dated the 23rd December 1912.*

1. The allowance for equipment and voyage of a Governor-General of India, resident in Europe at the time of his appointment, is fixed at 5,000*l.* If a Governor-General at the time of his appointment is resident in India or Ceylon, he shall receive an allowance of 3,000*l.* for equipment, but no allowance for voyage. If he is resident elsewhere than in Europe, India, or Ceylon, he shall receive an equipment allowance of 3,000*l.*, and such further allowance for voyage not exceeding 500*l.*, as shall be decided by the Secretary of State in Council according to the circumstances of the case.

2. Except as declared in these Rules, Government will make no arrangements for, and will defray none of the expenses connected with, the conveyance or passage of a Governor-General, his family, or suite, to or from India.

3. A newly appointed Governor-General proceeding to India from Europe to enter upon his office, may be accompanied by three combatant military officers for his personal staff, the expenses of whose passage to India or to Aden, as the case may be, will be defrayed by Government according to the rules in force in the Military Department as to military officers proceeding to India on duty. For such newly appointed Governor-General proceeding to India a steamer belonging to the Royal Indian Marine will (if consistent with the requirements of the public service and in accordance with the wishes of such

Governor-General) be provided to convey him and his family and suite from Aden to Bombay. Should he make use of this steamer he will bear the cost of entertainment and messing incurred while on board in respect of himself and his party, according to the rules in force relating to the conveyance of passengers in Royal Indian Marine troopships; and his allowance will be issued at the rate of 3,500*l.* only.

4. For an ex-Governor-General returning to Europe, on resignation, a steamer belonging to the Royal Indian Marine will (if consistent with the requirements of the public service) be gratuitously provided, to convey him and his family and suite to Suez; but the homeward voyage of the ship thus provided shall not be continued beyond Suez. The ex-Governor-General will bear the cost of entertainment and messing incurred while on board, in respect of himself and his party, according to the rules in force relating to the conveyance of passengers in Royal Indian Marine troopships.

5. No grant from Indian revenues will be made to any ex-Governor-General for his homeward journey from Suez.

6. An ex-Governor-General returning to Europe may be accompanied by two officers of his personal staff, for whom free passages to England will be allowed according to the rules in the Military Department, and also free return passages to India, if they start on their return voyage within two months from the date of quitting India.

7. In the event of a Governor-General dying and leaving a widow in India, a steamer belonging to the Royal Indian Marine will (if consistent with the requirements of the public service) be provided to convey her to Suez in like manner as in the case of an ex-Governor-General. The widow of a deceased Governor-General so returning to Europe may be accompanied by one officer of the personal staff, on the conditions mentioned in the preceding rule, and shall bear all such expenses as would, in ordinary course, be borne by an ex-Governor-General returning to Europe.

8. The allowance for equipment and voyage of a Governor of Madras, Bombay, or Bengal is fixed at 1,000*l.*, and that of a Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in India at 500*l.*, if resident in Europe at the time of appointment. If resident in India or Ceylon at the time of his appointment, a Governor shall receive 750*l.*, and a Commander-in-Chief 400*l.* for equipment, but no allowance for voyage. If at the time of his appointment a Governor or Commander-in-Chief is resident elsewhere than in Europe, India, or Ceylon, he shall receive the same equipment allowance of 750*l.* or 400*l.*, as the case may be, and such further allowance for voyage, not exceeding in the one case 250*l.*, and in the other case 100*l.*, as shall be decided by the Secretary of State in Council, according to the circumstances of the case. A Governor, however, who, having received on first appointment the allowance authorised by this rule, is subsequently transferred to another Presidency as Governor thereof, shall receive an allowance of 250*l.* plus the amount of the actual expenses incurred on account of the journey of himself, his family, personal staff and servants, and on account of the carriage of his and their effects.

9. A Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in India proceeding from Europe to assume his command may be accompanied by three combatant military officers for his personal staff, and newly appointed Governors of Madras, Bombay, or Bengal, similarly proceeding from Europe to take up their duties, may respectively be accompanied by two combatant military officers for their personal staff, the passages of these officers being provided at the expense of Government, according to the rules in force in the Military Department as to military officers proceeding to India on duty; but, with these exceptions, Government will make no arrangements for, and will defray none of the expenses connected with, the passage or conveyance of any of the officers mentioned in Rule 8, or of their families, to or from India.

10. An ex-Governor of Madras, Bombay, or Bengal, or an ex-Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in India (or the widow of a Governor or of a Commander-in-Chief who may die in India leaving a widow there), returning to Europe, may be accompanied by one officer of his personal staff, for whom a free passage will be allowed by Government according to the rules in force in the Military Department, and also a free return passage if he starts on the return voyage within two months from the date of quitting India.

11. The allowance for equipment and voyage of Members of the Council of the Governor-General of India and of Bishops of Calcutta, of Madras, and of Bombay, if resident in Europe at the time of appointment, respectively, is fixed at 300*l.* If resident in India or Ceylon at the time of his appointment, a Councillor or Bishop shall receive 225*l.* for equipment, but no allowance for voyage. If at the time of his appointment a Councillor or Bishop is resident elsewhere than in Europe, India, or Ceylon, he shall receive the same equipment allowance of 225*l.*, and such further allowance for voyage, not exceeding 75*l.*, as shall be decided by the Secretary of State in Council according to the circumstances of the case: Provided that no such Councillor or Bishop who is, when appointed, a Member of the Government Services in India shall receive any allowance wherever he may be at the time of his appointment.

12. An officer serving or residing out of Europe, but appointed during a temporary visit to Europe, shall not be deemed to be residing in Europe for the purpose of these Rules.

## II.

*Rules made under Statute 24 and 25 Vict., Cap. 194, Sec. 6, by the Secretary of State in Council of India, fixing the expenses for equipment and voyage of the Chief Justice and Judges of the several High Courts established under the said Statute, dated the 1st January 1888.*

39. For the purposes of defraying the expenses of equipment and voyage from Europe on first appointment, there shall be allowed—

## PART I.

*Rules regarding the grant of reserved accommodation by rail and steamer to certain high officials and the travelling allowance of such officers, and list of officers to whom free passes may be given for journeys by rail.*

1. When an Ordinary Member of the Supreme Council, or the President or a Member of the Railway Board, or the Chief Engineer with the Railway Board travels on duty over any railway in India, he is usually provided with a carriage specially constructed for his use, but if such carriage is not available he is entitled to an ordinary reserved carriage. In either case he is entitled to third class accommodation for not more than ten servants.

2. The reserved carriage is entirely at the disposal of the occupant when used by him, and may be detached and detained at any station on his requisition.

3. These officials named are also entitled to the conveyance of all their personal luggage at the public expense, whether taken in the luggage van of the train to which the reserved carriage is attached or sent by any other train. All freight charges for stores or goods so carried shall be paid for by the officials named out of their private funds, but whatever they vouch for as personal luggage shall pass as such.

4. Members of the family of these officials are not entitled to conveyance at the public expense, and should pay the ordinary fares whether they are travelling with the official or not.

5. The officers referred to in paragraph 1 should send to the Agent or Manager of the railway on which the journey is to commence a requisition in the prescribed form, on receipt of which the Agent or Manager will send all necessary instructions to the Station Master or other railway officials of that or other railway over which the journey is made or luggage sent. A bill will be drawn for the cost of the journey which together with the requisition will be submitted by the Auditor or Examiner of Accounts of the railway on which the journey is commenced to the Accountant-General with whom he is in account for payment, all such vouchers being accepted as sufficient authority for pre-audit payment. Should the Accountant-General desire further information before according final audit he should refer the matter to the Secretary, Railway Board.

6. It is not necessary for a requisition to be given for the empty haulage of carriages specially set apart for the use of these officials. In such cases a certificate will be furnished by the Traffic Manager, or Traffic Superintendent of the railway to the effect that the carriage was actually run empty for the distance for which the charge is to be recovered from Government and the bill paid thereon.

7. If it is impossible for an Ordinary Member of the Supreme Council, when travelling on duty, to arrange to travel by an ordinary train which is not a mail train, and the Railway authorities are unable to attach his carriage to the mail train, he is entitled to order a special train.

8. When the following high officials, namely,—Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, Ordinary Members of the Governor-General's Council, Members of the Executive Councils of the Governors and Lieutenant-Governors, Chief Commissioners, Residents of the first class, Judges of the High Courts and the Commissioner in Sind—travel by railway in the following cases, viz. (a) when proceeding to join office, (b) when retiring from the service, or proceeding to join another appointment, after having resigned office, or (c) when proceeding on or returning from leave :—

- (i) Any special or ordinary carriage or compartment usually assigned by rule to such officials, should, whenever practicable, be placed at their disposal, if so desired.
- (ii) The charges for the haulage of such carriages or compartments will be borne by Government as in the case of journeys made on duty; but the ordinary fare for the officer himself which would be paid if such accommodation were not provided will, subject to the exception in clause (iii), be recovered from him by Government. Fares for any members of his family travelling with him, whether they occupy his carriage or compartment or not, must, subject to the exception in clause (iii), be paid in cash to the Station Master at the station at which the journey commences.
- (iii) A Governor or Lieutenant-Governor proceeding to join his appointment or retiring from the service and leaving India is entitled to actual travelling expenses for himself and for any members of his family travelling with him. When accompanied by his family, their number should be separately shown in the requisition against the entry "other accommodation (if any)"; and the words "and that fares have been duly paid for,—1st class passengers travelling in the same carriage—compartment" in the centre foil scored out.

NOTE.—[Where full tariff rates are paid by Government for reserved accommodation, the fares paid by the officer for other persons, if any, sharing such accommodation will be credited to Government.]

9. The prescribed procedure regarding requisitions to railway administrations in regard to journeys performed on duty, shall be followed in the case of journeys *otherwise than on duty*, the fares payable being subsequently recovered by the Account Officer.

#### PART II.

*Rules regarding the travelling allowance of officers entitled to reserved railway carriages when travelling on duty.*

1. (a) Chief Commissioners and Residents of the first class are entitled, when travelling by railway, to a reserved first class carriage, and in addition—

- (i) for journeys within jurisdiction—to railway fares (if actually paid) for twelve servants at lowest class rates and to the freight of luggage not exceeding twenty-five maunds.
- (ii) for journeys outside jurisdiction and on transfer—to railway fares (if actually paid) for four servants at lowest class rates and to the freight of luggage not exceeding ten maunds.

(b) The Commissioner in Sind is entitled to a reserved first class carriage for journeys within his jurisdiction subject to the payment of first class fares for himself and for each person using the carriage.

(c) The Director, Criminal Intelligence, Agricultural Adviser to the Government of India, the Director-General of Telegraphs, and the Inspector-General of Irrigation, are each entitled to a reserved carriage when travelling by railway on a tour of inspection.

(d) The Secretary to the Government of India in the Foreign Department, when he travels by railway in his official capacity on special tours of duty, is provided with a reserved first class carriage.

2. Officers shown in sub-sections (a), (b), (c), (d) above are precluded by clause (f) of Note 1 to Article 999 from drawing any allowance under clause (i) of that article on any occasion on which they may utilize a reserved carriage.

#### PART III.

*Rules regarding the travelling allowance of officers entitled to reserved railway compartments and cabins in a steamer when travelling on duty.*

1. (a) A Judge of a High Court is entitled—

- (i) when travelling by railway to a reserved first class compartment and to fares (if actually paid) for four servants at lowest class rates;
- (ii) when travelling by steamer, to a reserved cabin, (if one is available) and to fares (if actually paid) for four servants at lowest class rates, subject to the usual deduction on account of messing charges; and
- (iii) when travelling by road, to a mileage of one rupee.

He is also entitled to draw daily allowance for each day on which he has been engaged in inspection work.

(b) Secretaries to the Government of India, other than the Secretary in the Foreign Department, who on certain occasions is entitled to a reserved carriage (*vide* clause (d) under Part II, above), Members of a Board of Revenue, Judges of a Chief Court and Financial Commissioners are entitled—

- (i) when travelling by railway, to a reserved first class compartment to be obtained by requisition notes, and to draw as travelling allowance for such journeys the actual travelling expenses incurred by them up to a maximum of one first class fare;
- (ii) when travelling by steamer, to a reserved cabin (if one is available), subject to the usual deduction on account of messing charges.

(c) The Director of Telegraph Construction is entitled to a reserved first class compartment with accommodation by the lowest class for three servants.

(d) The Resident at Baroda, when touring by Railway, is entitled to a reserved first class compartment, and to fares at lowest class rates (if actually paid) for two servants. He is also permitted to recover the actual cost of carriage by rail of two horses, when visiting outlying districts where local arrangements cannot be made for supplying means of travelling by road.

(e) The Political Agent in the Phulkian States and Bahawalpur is entitled to the free use of a first class compartment for a railway journey which begins and ends within the limits of the Native States under his political control.

(f) The Director-General of Education and the Sanitary Commissioner with the Government of India are entitled to a reserved first class compartment for any journeys by railway of over six hours or for any journey, any part of which is made between the hours 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., and, in addition, half the allowance ordinarily admissible.

(g) The Director-General, Indian Medical Service, when travelling by railway on inspection duty, is entitled to a reserved first class compartment for himself, and, in addition, to a single first class fare.

(h) The Surveyor-General is entitled to a reserved first class compartment when travelling by rail subject to the condition that the concession is liable to be withdrawn if he travels less than 10,000 miles annually. While travelling in the reserved compartment, he is also entitled to a single first class fare as travelling allowance.

(i) The Resident in Kashmir, when travelling on duty by railway between Sialkot and Jammu, is entitled to a reserved first class compartment and to fares at lowest class rates (if actually paid) for two servants.

2. Officers shown in sub-clauses (a), (c), (d) and (i) are not entitled when utilizing a reserved compartment to draw the allowance referred to in Article 999 (i), Civil Service Regulations.

\* Rules for free passes are embodied in Appendix No. 3 of the State Railway Open Line Code, Volume II.

(a) A gold pass entitles the holder to travel at any time over all Indian State Railways.

(b) A silver pass entitles the holder to travel at any time over the particular railway or railways for which it is granted.

A silver pass held by an officer of a Railway Company will permit the holder to travel over every State line in immediate connection with the railway to which that officer belongs.

A silver pass held by an officer of the Government Inspectors' Department holds good over every State line on which officers of that Department have official business.

(c) A card pass entitles the holder to travel over the particular railway, or portion of the railway for which it is granted, at any time within the dates specified on the pass.

As a rule, a card pass should only be issued for that portion of the railway over which the employé has to travel. It is left, however, to the discretion of the Manager to extend the privilege of the pass as occasion may require.

All other officers and employes permanently or temporarily attached to and actually employed on, a particular railway, and whose duties demand frequent travelling over the railway, or portions of it.

The following officers and employes of the :—

(i) Post Office :—

All Card Passes issued on Telegraph service should be endorsed as "available for Brake Vans of Goods Trains", while all First and Second Class Card Passes should, in addition, be endorsed as "available by any Passenger Train whether ordinary or otherwise".

Also at the discretion of the Manager—

Ministers who constantly minister to the spiritual wants of the servants of the Railway.

Contractors or Contractors' Agents employed in the construction or maintenance of the railway.

Refreshment Contractors.

(d) CHEQUE PASSES.

Assistant Directors-General of the Post Office, when travelling on *bona fide* postal service.

Employes of the Railway Mail and Sorting Service other than those entitled to Card Passes.

Persons other than those above mentioned, whose duties are connected with the Railway Telegraph, but which do not involve frequent travelling on the Railway.

Also to the following, at the discretion of the Manager :—

Officers of English, Foreign or other railways and their families.

NOTE.—[Officers travelling in the course of duty, who are eligible for travelling allowance for the performance of that duty, are not entitled to a free pass.]

The following dependents of Officers and Subordinates employed on the Railway.

The wife and legitimate children and step-children of an Officer residing with and wholly dependent on him. Also a mother or an unmarried sister residing with, and wholly dependent on, the Officer, if he is unmarried or a widower.

Ministers when occasionally ministering to the spiritual wants of the servants of the railway.

Refreshment Contractors' Agents and Managers attached to the railway refreshment rooms.

Newspaper correspondents.

#### APPENDIX No. 31—Referred to in Article 76½ (iii).

*Rules regulating the emoluments of Government officers whose services are lent for employment in Native States.*

1.—When the loan of an officer's services for employment under a Native State is sanctioned, the salary which it is proposed that the officer shall receive shall be precisely specified: and, if it is desired that he shall receive any remuneration or emolument in addition to his salary proper, the exact nature and value thereof shall be detailed in the orders approving his transfer to foreign service. No officer will be permitted to receive any remuneration or emolument, whether in cash or otherwise, other than as may be expressly enumerated in the order of sanction. If the orders are silent as to any particular form of remuneration the intention is that it shall not be received.

(d) Acheque entitles the holder to travel within the time and limits of distance specified on the pass.

II.—The concessions which may be sanctioned by a Local Government, in those cases in which it has the power under the rules in the Civil Service Regulations of sanctioning the transfer of an officer to service under a Native State, are as follows :—

- (i) Contributions towards leave and pension under the ordinary rules of the Civil Service Regulations.
- (ii) Exchange compensation allowance in the case of officers who were in receipt of it prior to the loan of their services to the Native State and to whom the State desires to grant it.
- (iii) Travelling allowance under the ordinary rules of the Civil Service Regulations or under the local rules of the Darbar if these are not more favourable, and fixed monthly travelling allowance, and conveyance and horse allowances in special cases where the circumstances so require.
- (iv) Tents, boats and transport on tour, under circumstances in which they would ordinarily be sanctioned in the case of an officer of corresponding position in British India, and on a similar scale, and subject to the rules of the Civil Service Regulations as to travelling allowance, etc. As an exception to this rule, a more extensive scale may be sanctioned for Indian officers only, provided that a reasonably equivalent reduction of the travelling allowance admissible under the ordinary rule is at the same time directed.
- (v) Free quarters to both European and Indian officers—
  - (a) when an officer of corresponding position in British India would be entitled to such a concession;
  - (b) when an officer is employed as a tutor, private secretary, or resident medical attendant, provided that such addition to his total emoluments is duly considered in fixing an appropriate rate of pay to be drawn by him;
  - (c) otherwise, and provided always that the concession is considered in determining an appropriate rate of pay—
    - (1) to a European officer, only if no other houses but such as are the property of the Darbar are available and the State is unwilling to accept rent;
    - (2) to an Indian officer, if having regard to the nature of his appointment such a concession is in accordance with local custom and the wishes of the State.

When quarters are occupied which are the property of the Native State, whether free or on the payment of rent, reasonable repairs to them may be effected at the cost of the State, but all material additions or alterations should receive the special sanction of the Local Government in each case.

- (vi) Free furniture in quarters which are the property of the State to Indian officers and in the case of European officers, only when employed as a tutor, private secretary or medical officer resident with a Chief, and only if in accordance with local custom and the wishes of the Darbar. The value of the concessions shall be considered in determining an appropriate rate of pay to be permitted to the officer concerned.
- (vii) The use of Darbar carriages and animals by an Indian officer, and in the case of European officers, only when employed as a tutor, private secretary or medical officer resident with a Chief, if the concession is in accordance with local custom and the wishes of the Darbar and subject to consideration in determining the rate of pay to be allowed.

III.—The following concessions may not be sanctioned by a Local Government. If it is desired to recommend the grant of any of them, the orders of the Government of India should be taken :—

- (i) Local and personal allowances.
- (ii) Free quarters to European and Indian officers under circumstances other than those provided for in paragraph II (v) above.
- (iii) The use of free furniture by European officers other than tutors, private secretaries or medical officers resident with a Chief.
- (iv) the use of Darbar carriages and animals by European officers other than tutors, private secretaries or medical officers resident with a Chief, at head-quarters.
- (v) Any other concession not within the powers of sanction of the Local Government, as stated in paragraph II above.

IV.—The following concessions are explicitly prohibited and will not be allowed in any case :—

Free provisions in any circumstances, and free lighting, fuel, fodder and supplies of any description at head-quarters.

NOTE.—[A copy of these Rules should be forwarded, both on first transfer and on renewal of an expired engagement by the Audit Officer concerned, to every officer of Government whose services are lent for employment in a Native State, the rules being attached to the orders regarding the payment of contributions for leave and pension which the Audit Officer issues to the officer transferred under Article 773, Civil Service Regulations.]

#### APPENDIX No. 32.

##### *Rules for the grant of Study Leave to Officers of Scientific and Technical Departments.*

The following rules relate to study leave only. They are not intended to meet the case of officers deputed to other countries at the instance of Government either for the performance of special duties imposed upon them, or for the investigation of specific problems connected with their technical duties. Such cases will continue to be dealt with on their merits under the provisions of Article 85 of the Civil Service Regulations, and it will be for the Government of India to decide on the recommendation of the Local Government or the Head of the Department, as the case may be, whether an officer shall be placed on deputation (with the approval of the Secretary of State) or granted study leave in accordance with the following rules. The rules do not apply to officers of the Indian Education Department, the Indian Medical Service, the Public Works Department, and the Indian Forest Service except in special cases where the existing rules regarding the study of Forestry in Europe on furlough are not suitable for application.

#### RULES.

1. Extra furlough for the purpose of study leave may be granted to officers by the Government of India on the recommendation of the Head of the Department or of the Local Government under whom the officer applying for leave is serving. The Government of India will require to be satisfied in each case that the knowledge sought to be acquired is of sufficient importance to warrant the grant of study leave. Such leave will not ordinarily be granted to officers of less than five years' service, or to officers within three years of the date at which they have the option of retiring on pension.

NOTE.—[Extra furlough for the purpose of study may be granted by the Government of India on the recommendation of the Director to any graded officer of the Geological Survey who has completed more than three and less than 18 years' service.]

2. The total period of study leave granted during an officer's service will not exceed 12 months in all.

3. Study leave will not be granted more than twice in an officer's service. The conversion under Rule 9 of part of an officer's furlough into study leave does not count as grant of study leave within the meaning of this rule.

4. The minimum period of leave granted solely as study leave will be six months. The time spent on the journey to and from India by an officer whose study leave has not been combined with any other kind of leave will reckon as study leave, but the lodging allowance specified in rule 10 will be granted during the period of study only.

5. Study leave can be combined with any other kind of leave, provided that the period occupied in study is not less than two months, and that in the case of leave on medical certificate the Medical Board at the India Office certifies that the officer is fit for study. The total period of absence from India will be limited to two years unless an extension beyond that period is necessary on grounds of health, and is otherwise admissible under the leave rules. Further, when study leave is combined with any other kind of leave, the total period of such combined leave must not, except in special cases, be less than six months.

6. An officer whose study leave is combined with any other kind of leave will be required to take his period of study leave at such a time as to retain, at its conclusion, a balance of other previously sanctioned leave sufficient to cover his return journey to India.

7. When an officer has been granted a definite period of study leave and finds after arrival in England that his course of study will fall short of the sanctioned period to any considerable extent, his absence from India will be reduced by the excess period of study leave unless he produces the assent of the authorities in India to his taking it as ordinary furlough.

8. Except as provided in rule 9, all applications for study leave shall be submitted with the audit officer's certificate to the Head of the Department through the prescribed

channel, and the course or courses of study contemplated and any examination a candidate proposes to undergo shall be clearly specified therein.

9. Officers on furlough or other leave who wish to have part of it converted into study leave should address the Under Secretary of State, India Office, and should attach (1) a statement showing how they propose to spend the study leave, and (2) documentary evidence that their application for the particular course of study or examination proposed has the approval of the proper authorities in India. Similarly, officers on furlough or other leave who desire to have it extended for purposes of study, should address the Under Secretary of State, but in addition to the above requirements they must support their applications with documentary evidence of their having obtained the approval of the authorities concerned in India to their applying for an extension of leave.

10. A lodging allowance at the rate of 6s. a day will be granted for the period spent in prosecuting a definite course of study at a recognised institution or in any definite tour of inspection of any special class of work. Special cases, in which on account of exceptional circumstances a higher rate of lodging allowance, or the grant of travelling expenses in addition to lodging allowance, is considered necessary will be referred to the Secretary of State for his orders.

11. Lodging allowance will be admissible up to 14 days for any period of vacation. A period during which an officer interrupts his course for his own convenience cannot be considered as vacation. In the case of an officer retiring from the service without returning to India after a period of study leave the lodging allowance will be forfeited. If the officer is under civil leave rules the study leave will be converted into furlough to the extent of the furlough standing to his credit at the date of retirement. Any balance of the period of study leave mentioned above which cannot be so converted will be excluded in reckoning service for pension.

12. On completion of study, the certificates of examinations passed or the certificates of special study, which must show the dates of commencement and termination of the course, with any remarks by the instructor, shall be forwarded to the Under-Secretary of State, India Office. In the case of definite courses of study at a recognised institution the lodging allowance will be payable at the India Office on claims submitted by the officer from time to time, supported by proper certificates of attendance. When the programme of study approved by the Government of India under rule 8 above does not include or does not consist entirely of such a course of study, the officer shall submit to the India Office a diary showing how his time has been spent, and a report indicating fully the nature of the methods and operations which have been studied, and including suggestions as to the possibility of applying such methods or operations to India. The Secretary of State will decide whether the diary and report show that the time of the officer has been properly employed, and will determine accordingly for what period the lodging allowance referred to in rule 10 above may be granted.

13. Study leave will count as service for promotion and pension, but except so far as it may be taken during privilege leave, not for furlough or any other leave. It will not affect any leave, which may already be due to an officer; it will count as extra furlough, and will not be taken into account in reckoning the aggregate amount of furlough taken by the officer towards the maximum period of six years admissible under Article 299 of the Civil Service Regulations.

14. An officer on privilege or combined leave may be permitted to commence a course of study before the end of his privilege leave, and to draw for such period the lodging allowance admissible under rule 10, without forfeiting his privilege leave allowance during such period. With the foregoing exception an officer, during study leave, will draw furlough pay. For all purposes of record and subsequent calculation of leave, the full amount of study leave taken shall in such cases be postdated as if it commenced at the end of the privilege leave.

Military officers in civil employ will be entitled to draw furlough pay as follows:—

- (a) To an officer taking study leave while under military leave rules: the rate of furlough pay admissible to him under those rules.
- (b) To an officer taking study leave while under civil leave rules: the rate prescribed in Article 314 of the Civil Service Regulations for an officer on ordinary furlough, subject to the limits laid down in Article 314 (a).

15. On an application for study leave being sanctioned the Government of India will inform the India Office of the particulars of the case and it will be necessary for the officer concerned to place himself in communication with the Secretary of State who will arrange any details and issue any letters of introduction that may be required.
